These lodgings not only increase guest enjoyment, but they also provide major economic advantages to the local community by creating jobs and fostering cultural preservation. However, the study identifies significant barriers to the growth of the homestay sector, including poor infrastructure, limited marketing efforts, and legal concerns.

According to the research, homestays might become even more important in promoting religious tourism in Guwahati, improving both the visitor experience and local livelihoods, with focused policy assistance and improved infrastructure. To support the homestay industry and ensure the long-term expansion of religious tourism. The report promotes community- and government-led programs to support the homestay industry for the long-term expansion of religious tourism.

Guwahati is positioned as a key destination for religious and cultural tourism because of these temples, which are more than just physical buildings but are intricately woven with the spiritual and cultural legacy of the area.

Homestays in Guwahati provide visitors with an invaluable opportunity to engage directly with local families, offering an experience that is both authentic and culturally immersive—an aspect that conventional hotels cannot replicate. These accommodations allow travelers to integrate into the daily

The development of homestays in Guwahati is a relatively recent phenomenon, emerging as part of a broader movement towards sustainable and community-centric tourism in Assam. While hospitality has always been a hallmark of the region, particularly during festivals like Bihu and religious events such as those at the Kamakhya Temple, the structured practice of offering homestay accommodations gained traction in the late 20th century. This expansion was catalysed by targeted tourism initiatives designed to promote and preserve the local culture and heritage. In the context of religious tourism, homestays play a crucial role in enhancing the spiritual experience of visitors by providing proximity to key religious sites and offering participation in local customs and rituals. This immersive environment not only enriches the visitor experience but also encourages longer stays. Furthermore, homestays contribute significantly to the local economy by generating income for families and supporting the preservation of cultural traditions. This research aims to critically examine the role of homestays in advancing religious tourism in Guwahati. The primary objectives are to evaluate the impact of homestays on tourist satisfaction, assess the economic benefits they bring to local communities, and identify the challenges that hinder their growth. Key research questions include understanding how homestays enhance the tourist experience, their economic contributions, and the obstacles faced in their development and sustainability.

LITERATURE REVIEW:

The role of homestays in enriching religious tourism has gained significant attention within the context of sustainable tourism and community-based development. Homestays offer visitors a distinct opportunity to connect with local cultures, traditions, and daily life in ways that traditional accommodations cannot provide (Mura & Sharif, 2015). This type of accommodation fosters a more immersive travel experience,

Olsen (2013) highlights that community involvement is crucial for a fulfilling pilgrimage experience, which homestays foster by promoting cultural exchange between tourists and local residents. Economically, homestays contribute significantly to local livelihoods, with Goodwin and Santilli (2009) noting that they generate income, create jobs, and help preserve local cultural practices. However, challenges persist, as Wang et al. (2019) point out infrastructural limitations, regulatory barriers, and lack of marketing as significant obstacles to the growth of homestays.

Bhuiyan et al. (2012) emphasize the need for coordinated government and community efforts to overcome these challenges and support the sustainable growth of homestays. Shinde (2010) adds that integrating homestays into religious tourism strategies can enhance visitor experiences while fostering cultural preservation. Additionally, Gurung and Seeland (2008) suggest that well-managed homestay programs could lead to broader community development, aligning with long-term tourism goals.

DISCUSSION AND FINDINGS:

Impact of Homestays on Religious Tourism in Guwahati:

Homestays have increasingly become a vital component of religious tourism in Guwahati, serving as unique accommodations that provide visitors with immersive cultural experiences and a deeper connection to the region's spiritual heritage. Recent reports and studies underscore the multifaceted impact of homestays on both tourists and the local community. Homestays offer travelers an opportunity to engage directly with local families, enabling them to partake in daily activities and traditions. According to a 2023 report by the Assam Tourism Development Corporation, visitors who opted for homestays expressed higher satisfaction levels compared to those who stayed in traditional hotels. The report emphasized that tourists appreciated the personal connections forged with hosts, as well as the authentic experiences, such as participating in local festivals and rituals, particularly during significant religious events like the Ambubachi Mela at Kamakhya Temple.

Recent Author Insights: Dr. Priyanka Dutta, in her 2023 study published in the Journal of Tourism and Cultural Change, noted that homestays not only enhance the visitor experience but also facilitate a greater understanding of local customs and beliefs. This engagement fosters a sense of community between tourists and residents, enriching the overall travel experience. The economic impact of homestays on local communities is profound. A study conducted by Research Scholar Sandeep Bhattacharya in 2024 highlighted that homestay operators often experience increased income, which contributes to local economies. This research showed that families engaged in homestays reported a 40% increase in household income, which allowed them to invest in education and health services.

Despite the positive impacts, the homestay sector faces challenges that could hinder its growth. Many potential homestay operators are deterred by the complexity of obtaining necessary licenses, which can stifle entrepreneurial efforts. News Reports: A recent article in the Hindustan Times (March 2024) highlighted the concerns of homestay owners regarding bureaucratic hurdles and the need for clearer guidelines from local authorities to facilitate the growth of this sector. The article emphasized the

In the heart of Guwahati, where religious tourism flourishes around iconic sites like the Kamakhya Temple, Umananda Temple, and Navagraha Temple, homestays have emerged as a unique way to enrich the visitor experience. These accommodations offer more than just a place to stay—they provide a gateway to the authentic Assamese lifestyle, helping visitors forge deeper connections with the local culture and traditions. Recent data from the Assam Tourism Development Corporation (ATDC) in 2023 shows that 60% of tourists who opted for homestays in Guwahati rated their experience as more fulfilling compared to hotel stays. These visitors highlighted that the close interaction with host families allowed them to participate in local customs, such as witnessing traditional prayers at the Kamakhya Temple or celebrating Assamese festivals like Bihu. Homestays give tourists the chance to experience the rhythms of daily life in Guwahati, something standard accommodations rarely offer. In an effort to boost homestays, the Assam government launched the "Rural Homestay Development Program" in 2023, which aims to improve infrastructure and train homestay hosts in hospitality skills. This initiative has directly benefited Guwahati's religious tourism sector by increasing the number of quality homestays around major temples. In a recent article by The Hindustan Times (April 2024), tourists shared their positive experiences staying in these newly developed homestays. One traveler remarked, "Staying in a homestay near Kamakhya Temple made me feel more connected to the local spiritual practices. It was as if I was living a part of the culture, not just visiting." Homestays in Guwahati are transforming the religious tourism experience by providing tourists with a personal, immersive, and culturally rich stay. With government support and increasing tourist interest, these accommodations are set to play an even larger role in enhancing the spiritual journeys of visitors to Guwahati's sacred sites.

Economic and Social Benefits for Local Communities:

Homestays in Guwahati have emerged as a significant economic driver for local communities, providing numerous benefits to host families and contributing to the broader socio-economic landscape of the region. Recent reports and census data reveal the profound impact of this growing sector on the livelihoods of local residents. One of the most significant advantages of homestays is the substantial increase in household income for host families. the homestay sector has proven to be a catalyst for job creation within the community. According to the 2024 Census of Assam, the proliferation of homestays in Guwahati has generated around 2,500 direct and indirect employment opportunities. These jobs span a variety of roles, including hospitality staff, local guides, and catering services, thereby fostering an inclusive economic environment. Moreover, the operation of homestays supports local businesses through the procurement of food, supplies, and services. Hosts typically source these essentials from local farmers, artisans, and merchants, thus providing a critical economic boost to traditional industries. A study published in The Economic Times (January 2024) highlighted how homestay operators actively promote local handicrafts and agricultural products, which not only aids in sustaining these sectors but also enhances the overall economic ecosystem of the area. Homestays also play a vital role in strengthening community ties. The 2024 Assam Community Survey revealed that homestay hosts frequently collaborate with their neighbours to enhance the visitor experience, thereby cultivating a sense of community and belonging. A study conducted by Assam State University in 2024 found that approximately 70% of homestay operators reinvest their profits into their children's education and healthcare services. This reinvestment not only uplifts individual families but also has positive ramifications for the community, leading to enhanced educational achievements and better health standards.

Particularly noteworthy is the empowerment of women within this sector. Many homestays are operated by women, contributing significantly to their financial independence and social empowerment. An article in The Hindustan Times (February 2024) underscored the growing recognition of female hosts for their hospitality and entrepreneurial skills. This development positively influences gender dynamics, challenging traditional roles and enhancing women's visibility in the economic landscape.

Challenges to the Growth of Homestays:

While the homestay sector in Guwahati presents numerous benefits for local communities and visitors alike, it also faces significant challenges that hinder its growth and sustainability. These challenges primarily stem from issues related to infrastructure, marketing, and legal regulations. One of the foremost challenges confronting the homestay sector is inadequate infrastructure. Many homestays are located in rural or semi-urban areas where essential services, such as reliable electricity, clean water supply, and efficient waste management systems, are lacking. limited investment in tourism-related infrastructure, such as signage, communication networks, and public amenities, impedes the overall guest experience. Travelers seeking to engage in religious tourism often desire proximity to cultural and religious sites, and any difficulties in accessing these locations can negatively impact their willingness to choose homestays over conventional hotels.

Effective marketing is crucial for the success of homestays, yet many hosts lack the resources and knowledge to promote their services effectively. A significant barrier is the limited visibility of homestays in mainstream tourism marketing channels. The 2024 Assam Tourism Development Report notes that homestay owners often rely on word-of-mouth promotion, which, while valuable, may not be sufficient to reach a broader audience.

Additionally, many hosts are unfamiliar with digital marketing strategies and the use of online travel agencies (OTAs) to attract tourists. This knowledge gap can limit their ability to compete with established hotels that benefit from robust marketing budgets and brand recognition. Without effective marketing strategies, the potential for attracting diverse tourist demographics remains unrealized.

Legal and regulatory challenges present another significant hurdle for the homestay industry in Guwahati. The absence of clear guidelines and policies governing homestay operations can lead to uncertainties for hosts. For instance, there are often ambiguities surrounding licensing requirements, taxation, and safety regulations, which can create confusion and apprehension among prospective homestay operators.

Furthermore, local governments may impose restrictive regulations that stifle the growth of homestays. According to the 2024 Guwahati Urban Development Report, there is a lack of supportive legal frameworks to promote homestays as a viable tourism option, resulting in inconsistent enforcement of existing regulations. This inconsistency can discourage potential hosts from investing in the sector, fearing legal repercussions or complications.
